Several neighbours have expressed shock at Rodriguez' denunciation and volunteered information which might confirm the past existence of a clandestine prison.

Two employees at a car electricity repair shop on the corner of Venancio Flores and Emilio Lamarca, a few doors from the suspected premises, said they had witnessed the escape of a woman and a man - both of them - from handcuffed Automotores Orletti in 1976 or 1977, .

"The woman," another neighbour said, "was nude from the waist up. After both had run across the railway tracks, they escaped in a car which they stopped in the street.

The same man, who refused to give his name, said the t door at Venancio Flores 3521 1 was made of iron, much thicker than the one there is now, and had in its upper section a peephole that resembled a camera lens."
